THE AMAZING TRANSFORMATION OF THE TREE OF LIFE MURAL by Heather Kendall and Linda Miller



This set of photos shows the transformation timeline of the build out of the scaffolding. The first photo far left is day one of the build out. The second photo left shows Gilco Scaffolding Company using a pulley system to deliver materials. The third photo is half way finished. The fourth center photo shows Angel an employee of Gilco carrying pipe. Finally, the fifth photo is of the build-out which is three quarters of the way finished, the sixth photo shows the top of the pulley system with a bar being lifted, and the seventh photo far right is the total build out of the scaffolding.

There are amazing things happening in the sanctuary of Historic Second Church! Many of you will remember or will have donated to the Tree of Life and Surrounding Chancel Artwork Conservation Project. (See the Spring 2022 edition of The Herald.) That conservation work is now underway. The beauty of these artworks has been partially obscured by the dirt of 100+ years. Friends' goal for this project is to clean all the art on the west wall of the sanctuary and repair any problem areas so that they last for another 100 years. In this article we will share with you some of the surprises that have been uncovered during the first month of the fourmonth conservation work.

The first step in the project was to erect the 65-foot high scaffolding to enable the conservators to reach the mural, the west walls, the light fixtures, the wooden arches, and the metal organ screen. It took Gilco Scaffolding three full weeks to erect the scaffolding. It is an engineering marvel in its own right.

Once the scaffolding was in place, the conservators from Parma Conservation began the cleaning and repair of Frederic Clay Bartlett's Tree of Life mural. This was their first opportunity to see the mural up close. Elizabeth Kendall, the President of Parma Conservation remarked that she was surprised to find the mural in such excellent condition after more than a century. There was no under-lying plaster damage. We are now finishing week five of that conservation work. What is being revealed is astounding! The lacquer on the mural had darkened over the years. There is evidence that portions of the mural had received an inartful touch-up paint job at some point. The result of the darkened lacquer, the 100 years of dirt and the touch-up painting has been to obscure the true beauty and colors of Bartlett's original creation.

The underlying colors are much more vivid than what we are accustomed to seeing. These pictures reveal the progress on the mural over the last few weeks.

Painters from National Decorating

Services spent two and a half weeks cleaning the walls and the decorative plaster arch atop the pulpit. Again, the wall was in remarkably good shape and needed only minor repair. But

the dirt was extensive. There was so much dirt that the painters had to wash the wall three times before they were able to paint it. We've included a picture of the paint work on the arch.

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These photos show the evolution of the same angel receiving what we might call a "face lift" by Parma Conservation's Peter Schoenmann. Peter found that Frederic Clay Bartlett's original angel face had been repainted in an earlier restoration. He created a tracing from the angel directly opposite of the one in the above photos. A clear plastic material for the drawing was made to help produce a reverse stencil technique; ensuring that both faces were the same as Frederic Clay Bartlett had intended.

Cleaning, repairing and rewiring of the seven light fixtures over the pulpit is also a piece of the Tree of Life Conservation Project. That too revealed some surprises. When B & cleaning, repair and Z Electric removed the light



fixtures, they discovered that the old 1901 cloth project. -covered wiring was not enclosed in a steel conduit, as exists in other areas of the sanctuary. Rather, the old

wiring was simply lying directly on the wooden arch. We are pleased to report that new steel conduit has been installed, the old wiring removed and new wiring installed.

The light fixtures themselves have been removed to the Archistoric Studio for rewiring of the fixtures. They will be reinstalled at the end of the

Next steps include the cleaning and

repair of the four life-sized heralding angels, the cleaning and polishing of the pulpit woodwork, the cleaning and repair of the metal organ screens, the installation of new acoustic curtains behind the choir loft and the placement of specially designed lighting to illuminate the mural.

The work is tentatively set to be completed in December. Stop by while

the work is still in process and see for yourself the amazing transformation occurring at Historic Second Church.

The supplies used were very long strands of cotton and a mixture of ethanol and acetone. In an amazing transformation in the third photo pictured from the left you can see that the dirt, varnish, and paint disappear and what is left is the white robes of the angel.

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INSTALLATION OF ST. PAUL TIFFANY WINDOW

There was great excitement during the week of October 24th when Venturella Studio, Bulley Andrews Masonry

Restoration, Ralph Simpson and Wiss, Janney, Elstner staff all assembled to reinstall the restored 1895 Tiffany window, St. Paul Preaching at Athens. Prior to its conservation the window was marred by dirt and degraded painting. Portions of the window were completely obscured by the dirt. Tom Venturella and Jim Murphy worked their magic over the last year: cleaning, repairing and in some cases repainting portions of the painted glass that were beyond a simple touch up. The restored window is now in place. The walls surrounding the window were replastered and repainted. Finally, the scaffolding was removed on November 10, just in time for the celebratory event for St. Paul. The transformation is stunning! Plan to visit and
