PULPIT FURNITURE BY JOHN A. COLBY & SONS by William Tyre

The set of furniture on the pulpit platform has been in place since the reconstruction of the church in 1901. Records indicate that the pieces were acquired for \$366.00 from John A. Colby & Sons, a leading manufacturer and retailer of furniture in Chicago. In this article, we will examine the history of the Colby company, the pieces acquired by the church, and how they fit into Shaw's master plan for the sanctuary.

JOHN A. COLBY

The Colby furniture company had its origins in a furniture and auction house founded in 1869 by John A. Colby and Jacob C. Wirts. A decade later, Colby bought out his partner and began producing high end furniture. He built a large factory on Elizabeth Street and by 1901 employed 100 men, with the factory providing nearly threequarters of the furniture in his Wabash Avenue store. The company produced custom furniture following sketches created by architects and interior decorators, or the company's own designers. By this time, Colby had also expanded into providing custom interior woodwork, curtains, and draperies, and provided the large embroidered and appliquéd curtain for the stage of the Auditorium Theatre when it

opened in 1889.

Colby's two sons, Henry and Edward, joined the business in the early 1880s and the name was changed to John A. Colby & Sons in 1884. The company became a training ground for a number of individuals who went on to become prominent furniture designers and manufacturers. Among these were George Clingman, who headed Colby's special order department for a decade before

becoming head designer at the Tobey Furniture Company, and designer Alexander Hompe who eventually left the firm to become president of the Royal Furniture Company in Grand Rapids, Michigan. In the mid-1890s, Colby became one of the first Chicago-based manufacturers to specialize in colonial reproduction furniture, advertised as "exact reproductions of the best existing types of rare Colonial masterpieces."

The huge Wabash Avenue store was destroyed in a catastrophic fire in 1908, but it was rebuilt shortly before Colby died the next year at the age of 76. His

son Henry died in 1910, and the business was sold. By the 1920s, the production end of the business came to an end, but Colby's remained a prominent Chicago furniture retailer until the last store in Lincolnwood closed in 1991.

FURNITURE AT SECOND
The furniture purchased during the rebuilding of Second
Presbyterian included the pastor's chair and table, two side chairs, and two chairs for the narthex. These latter chairs are classic examples of Windsor sack-back arm chairs and were probably stock pieces manufactured by Colby as part of its line of Colonial reproduction furniture.

It is quite possible that the two side chairs on the pulpit were stock pieces as well, as the Colby company produced many examples of historic-based furniture. The chairs, with their wavy X silhouette, are based on an early form of a chair known variously as an X-frame, Dante, scissors, or Savonarola chair. The form upon which they are based became popular in Medieval and Renaissance Italy

and was designed as a portable folding chair like its original inspiration, the ancient Roman curule. The two chairs at Second are not meant to be folding chairs, but are made from heavy oak with elaborate carved bearded faces forming finials at either side of the back.

The two most significant pieces of furniture in the sanctuary are the pastor's chair and table, which were no doubt designed by Shaw and executed by the craftsmen at the Colby factory. Made of quarter-sawn oak, both pieces sit upon squat bun feet and feature carvings of the pomegranate and grape motifs found throughout the sanctuary. The table is designed with two lower shelves to hold books and papers, and features straight lines with the carving confined to the area just below the top. The chair features a series of four distinct carved panels on each side, with a

continuous stem sprouting pomegranates in one panel and grapes in the next. An interesting feature is the inclusion of the date on the front of the chair, consisting of "A. D." and "1901" flanking a central carved foliate panel. This is a device found on other pieces of furniture designed by Shaw. The overall shape of the pastor's chair is simple but graceful with gently curving armrests extending up to carved finials at the top of the high back.

Although often overlooked by visitors to the sanctuary, the pulpit furniture tells an important story of a prominent Chicago furniture manufacturer working closely with an architect to select and produce handsome designs that blend harmoniously into the overall scheme of the sanctuary. We are fortunate that the pieces have remained in their exact positions for more than 110 years, continuing to combine functionality with artistic design.

THREE GENEROUS GIFTS RECEIVED


It is with gratitude that Friends acknowledges three recent, generous gifts to underwrite the cost of an inspection and report on the exterior condition of the building. A heartfelt thank you to The Richard H. Driehaus Foundation and the Alphawood Foundation which have each granted Friends \$35,000 for this work and to the National Trust for Historic Preservation for a gift of \$5,000. The inspection and report are being conducted by Wiss, Janney, Elstner Associates, Inc., an internationally recognized firm of architects, structural engineers, and material scientists specializing in the investigation, testing, and design of repairs for buildings. Their comprehensive report will detail the condition of the exterior and contain a prioritized list of repair recommendations. It will be the basis for the upcoming work to the church exterior. It will also ensure that this historically and culturally relevant Chicago landmark can be safeguarded for present and future generations to enjoy and appreciate.

TOUR HOWARD VAN DOREN SHAW'S MARKTOWN WITH FRIENDS

At 10:00am on September 19th Nate Lielasus and Bill Tyre will lead a tour of Howard Van Doren Shaw's Marktown, a unique English Arts and Crafts village surrounded by the refineries and mills of Northwest Indiana. It was built in 1917 for Clayton Mark as a planned worker community similar to Pullman to house workers of the Indiana Harbor Works of the Mark Manufacturing Company. The community originally included a Market Square, hotel, garage, manager's houses and several models of worker housing. Recent demolition by the BP Whiting Refinery threatens the integrity, character, and survival of the community. Pre-paid tickets are \$25 and the tour is open to the public. 

WHAT ROLE DID CHICAGO PLAY IN THE LIVES OF ABRAHAM AND ROBERT TODD LINCOLN?


